Talent Opportunities Program (TOP)

- TOP is an initiative of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce (OCC) designed to help employers located anywhere in Canada hire college and university students on work-integrated learning (WIL) placements
- Employers gain access to a broad pool of student talent, helping meet business needs and growing their talent pipeline
- Eligible employers hiring eligible students may receive a wage subsidy up to 50% to a maximum of \$5,000 or up to 70% to a maximum of \$7,000 for students in under-represented groups (i.e. the subsidy maxes out when a student's wages reach \$10,000)
- TOP is funded through the Government of Canada's Student Work Placement Program (SWPP)
- There are other similar funding programs under SWPP; TOP is generally more flexible than similar programs
 - Local chambers can also access the grant when hiring eligible students
 - Valuable opportunity for your members





Key eligibility criteria for employers

- Registered Canadian business or not-for-profit organization
- Committed to paying the student for the role for the duration of the placement (wage subsidies are administered at the end of the placement)
- In compliance with all federal and provincial employment laws and regulations
- Covered by Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB) or alternate workplace insurance
- Only submitting applications for placements that are not subsidized by any other federal funding program
- Employers may be located anywhere in Canada and may operate in any industry sector
- Notable exclusions:
 - Financial sector employers, such as banks and insurance companies, or businesses operating in similar areas
 - Government entities (including crown corporations, hospitals, post-secondary institutions, etc.)
 - Organizations engaged in partisan political activities





Key eligibility criteria for students being hired

- Registered as a domestic student in a recognized Canadian post-secondary institution in any program of study (both full-time and part-time students are eligible)
- Enrolled in a program or course where a WIL component (i.e. work placement) is part of the study plan
 - Note: apprenticeships are not eligible
 - The student's post-secondary institutions must validate the placement as satisfying their WIL requirements
- Canadian citizens, permanent residents, or persons to whom refugee protection has been conferred under the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act (international students are not eligible)
- Students related to the employer (i.e. a family member or relative) are generally not eligible please inquire and declare a conflict of interest
- Students will be required to provide some basic information and sign a student agreement as part of the employer's application for funding
- Students must be on the employer's payroll as an employee (contractors are not eligible)





Funding & placement details

- Approximately 700 subsidies are available per year for the next two years
- 50% wage subsidy to a maximum of \$5,000 per placement for non-designated students
- 70% wage subsidy to a maximum of \$7,000 per placement for students who identify and self-declare in an underrepresented group:
 - Indigenous people
 - Person with disabilities
 - Newcomer to Canada
 - First year student
 - Visible minority
 - Women in STEM





Funding & placement details

- Funding is available only to 'net new' placements each fiscal year relative to their baseline number of hires (i.e. the incremental number of placements compared to the year prior to the employer first receiving SWPP funding)
- Subsidies for each placement are calculated based on wages within a specified funding term:
 - Summer (May August)
 - Fall (September December)
 - Winter (January April)
- Students on a WIL placement spanning multiple terms are eligible for multiple subsidies (must submit a new application for each applicable term)
- Placements can be partially government-funded from non-federal sources, but only funds from non-governmental sources can be subsidized





How to apply

- Online application portal currently accepting applications for Summer 2022
 - Employers can apply retroactively if the term is still available for selection
- Applications will only receive approval after an eligible student has been hired and all employer and student information/documents have been submitted for review
- After an application is approved, documents such as the mid-term check-in, pay stubs and exit surveys must be submitted prior to issuing payment
- Remember that it is up to the employer to ensure they meet the criteria and have hired an eligible student applications will be declined if eligibility is not met or supporting documents are not provided
